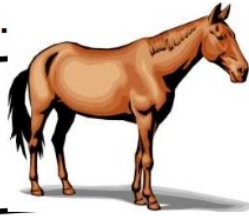

Back in 1995 when we were doing horse shows, a neighbor showed up and asked if there were any opportunities to volunteer. Always short for workers for these events, the normal application procedure (mirror fogging) was set aside. She was given a walkie-talkie and clipboard. As an enticement to get her to come back, we quickly created the title (unbeknownst to her) *Gate Meister* and proudly knighted her with said honor.

Towards the end of that season, she asked about the then shuttered tack store. We spoke for a while. A week later she returned with a thorough business plan with very modest goals. Given that store space was empty, any offer looked good, so we agreed and off she went.

Now in a blink of an eye, 12 years have sped by, and the *Gate Meister* a.k.a. Lisa Evans, now prepares to move to new challenges. A few months ago she casually mentioned that she was entering her 12th year running the store. I was dumbfounded that so much time had elapsed. Then 45 days ago it became clear to her that it was time for a new chapter in her life.

So effortlessly (at least to us outsiders) did the tack store naturally blossom, the modest goals have been surpassed by orders of magnitude. She did what no one previously did by making the tack store a successful and positive

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environment. Things happen for a reason, and when Lisa put the word out that she was thinking about selling her store, she was overwhelmed with interest. This is a real complement for what she created.

The extended SCR family is wide and deep. From the occasional lesson taker to, trainers and employees, to boarders who have become more like residents, the collective accumulation of experiences is incalculable. Beyond the saddles, rakes, bags of feed, there is the mystical plane of SCR. Each day, hundreds of people come here to experience the magic of the horses, as well as each other. Each day immeasurable experiences take place that spread across these 7+ acres. While I might "own" the stable, in truth SCR has a life of its own. She has literally played an invaluable role in the thousands of people that have crossed the front gates of SCR. And with that same self directed life that is SCR, it is time for her to continue her journey outside the gates of the stable.

Who are these new owners of the tack store? Like you I know very little about Michiko and Wade Wright. What will they be like? Will they fit into Serrano? There is one thing that is true, that each year Serrano becomes a better place, because of the actions of all those who have come earlier. And to that end, the right people are attracted at the right time. Just like how Lisa was attracted to the stable, a fleeting 12 years ago.

Over the years it seems, (well not seems, is true), that the number and size of trailers has exploded. At one time there were only a few of the Queen Mary's docked at Serrano, now we look like the port of Long Beach. Arriving in the early morning I expect to see, stevedores warming there hands over fires built in barrels.

This all results in a parking congestion that would make any cardiac surgeon get excited. If the trailers were parked in an organized manner, much more space would be opened up for car parking.

As a remedy we will be trying an experiment placing fiberglass stakes to delineate each parking space. The stakes are normally used along the sides of roadways, and are designed to give, and even bend over if hit hard enough. The first trial will be with the trailers that are across from the 24' x 24's. The old rotted ground posts will be removed and stakes will be put in place. When you are at the stable, your actions not only affect you, but it is inevitable that there is another horse close by. Intoxication on any level not only impairs your reactions, but the ability to make sound judgments is diminished. Your actions have tremendous effects on others.

Alcohol and drugs have no place around horses. As each one of us comes to the stable, we have the right to spend the next few hours in the safest possible environment. If you have enjoyed "a cool one" in the past, now is the time to change that habit. Going forward we ask you refrain from drinking when at the stable. If this proves difficult for you, the coarsest truth is that you will be promptly asked to leave the stable should it be learned that you are drinking or providing to others alcohol / drugs. Safety is just too important!
